HIGHLAND RESCUE TEAM VOLUNTEERS - 50 YEARS OF SERVICE TO COMMUNITY!

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD: We are celebrating almost 50 years of service to our community. The Team wants to express its deep appreciation for the on-going support and confidence that you have given us. We remain committed to providing excellence in pre-hospital medical care. You demonstrated that confidence when you authorized the creation of the Special District in 2004. Thanks to you, the 2 mill tax levy approved ensures the District is financially sound and has the resources to provide 24/7 Advanced Life Support service to the residents of the District and those that transit the District daily. Volunteer leadership has increased membership to over 50, including 14 paramedics, and over 35 EMTs and First Responders. In order to provide adequate quarters for our members, the District is embarking on an expansion of our Lookout Mountain Road Station. Thanks to the Highland Rescue Team Foundation and prudent financial management by the Board, the District will incur no debt with the expansion and require no increase in millage.

Did you know that Sudden Cardiac Arrest claims almost 1000 lives a day just in the U.S.? Eighty two percent of out-of-hospital cardiac arrests happen in the home. Even with an average response time of only 5 minutes, EMS professionals may not arrive in time to help the victim. It is time for you to know how to help.

The great thing is, CPR is easier than ever to learn and remember. With a much greater emphasis on compressions, not only is the new method easier, it is more effective and we are actually saving more lives!

Our instructors are kind and compassionate. They will do their best to take the fear out of helping a victim. They will leave you feeling confident and capable of helping others.

New CPR standards have been issued by the American Heart Association. Be up to date and ready to save a life!

"BUY A ROCK" CAMPAIGN: The proposed rock façade of the station will be the subject of a capital fund drive. It is estimated to cost approximately \$15,000. The rock will match the stone on the main building at Mount Vernon Country Club as close as possible. A plaque will honor those donating \$100 or more to the "Buy a Rock" campaign. MOUNT VERNON METROPOLITAN DISTRICT ALLOWS USE OF 1/3 ACRE FOR PARKING SPACE. The generosity of Mount Vernon and its proprietary members will provide parking space for Highland members. The Mount Vernon Metropolitan District and Highland Rescue Team Ambulance District entered into an Intergovernmental Agreement for use of 1/3 of an acre just north of the Station which will provide 14 new parking spaces. The land will be graded and paved. The current price of asphalt may cause a delay in the final paving.

HIGHLAND FOUNDATION CONTRIBUTES \$200,000 FOR EXPANDED STATION:

The Highland Rescue Team Foundation Board of Directors voted unanimously to contribute \$200,000 to the cost of expanding the Station. The Foundation was originally created to protect a gift of approximately \$150,000 given to the Team in the late 1990's. Good investment and additional contributions grew the principal to over \$400,000. The Station expansion was identified as the most critical need for the Team, and the Foundation Board determined that a sizeable contribution to the Team was warranted.

THE TEAM: 86% VOLUNTEERS.

ADVANCED LIFE SUPPORT — **AROUND THE CLOCK.** The Highland Rescue Team is at full strength; there are 14 paramedics, and over 35 EMTs and First Responders providing coverage 24/7 to the 12,500 residents of the District and those that transit the District (80,000 vehicles/day). Sixteen of the Team Members live in District, seven in the Lookout Mountain area, eight live in Genesee and one in Idledale.

Volunteers contribute EMS duty hours of service valued at \$250,000+ each year to the District. Training and non-EMS service to the District are valued at an additional \$150,000. Thanks to all our volunteers for their service to the District.

HIGHLAND GOES GREEN — A SOLAR SYSTEM INSTALLED AT HIGHLAND STA-

TION: Last Spring a Solar system was installed at Highland Station. The system has generated 6118 kWh of electricity and saved 10,400 lbs of CO2 since it was installed in April 2010.



HIGHLAND OFFERS WILDERNESS FIRST

AID COURSE: This 2 day hands on course is designed for people who spend time in places where emergency response is typically delayed. The focus is on commonly encountered injuries

and illnesses, and managing these problems. Improvisation and adaptability are encouraged. The course emphasizes practical solutions using equipment typically carried with groups into remote locations.
