# Message from Chief Bob Fager

Highland Rescue Team strives to provide the highest possible service to our community. To ensure this, we have recently focused on increased safety for our community and our ourselves.

Standard ambulance design used across the U.S. makes wearing a seatbelt while caring for patients unworkable. The design of our **new ambulance** changes that. Rather than having benches for our medics, it has seats with four-point seatbelts. Nearly everything is within reach from these seats. Our patients have always worn seatbelts in the back of the ambulance. Now we do too.

Another change we have recently made is far less flashy than a new ambulance but equally focused on safety. We have dramatically **reduced our use of lights and sirens** when responding to calls. Evidence shows the use of lights and sirens improves patient outcomes in only a few cases. It does, however, significantly increase our odds of being involved in a collision. In collaboration with our dispatchers, we now use lights and sirens only on the calls where their use might make a difference to our patient.

The third big change at Highland is the addition of a Community Paramedicine program. This program is not quite off the ground yet but should be operational soon. Community Paramedicine is an emerging healthcare delivery model. It allows specially trained medics to assist and care for patients in their homes and in other locations outside of a hospital. Community Paramedics help fill gaps in our healthcare system, reduce trips to doctors and emergency departments, decrease hospital readmission rates, improve people's quality of life, and decrease healthcare costs. We are looking forward to being able to better serve our community with our Community Paramedicine program.

first quarter of 2021, Mario signed up for 311 shift hours. That




comes to 26 hours a week that he worked on top of his regular paid job. We are fortunate to have Mario as part of the team.

Hello neighbors! As the new Paramedic/Training Coordinator for Highland Rescue Team, I am honored to work with such an

outstanding team of Emergency Medical Services providers in such a uniquely situated and special area. The Foothills, Genesee & Idledale communities are beautiful but also present unique challenges for First Responders. One of those challenges is that 911 calls are never scheduled, and multiple calls can and do occur simultaneously and often in the distant outreaches of the district with longer response times. This is true with every

type of call – from motor vehicle accidents to heart attacks, strokes, and cardiac arrests. This is where you can help. Though we are ready 24/7 to respond to all 911 calls when you need us, we are most effective when our community members are trained and ready to provide First Aid including stroke recognition and even CPR when necessary. Early recognition and intervention through bystander CPR saves lives, period. To that end, Highland Rescue Team looks forward to offering free CPR training to community members this Fall.



Taking this course and being ready to act in a crisis could be the greatest gift you give a family member, friend, or neighbor.


### The Highland Rescue Team Your 911 Medical Response

We are your 911 Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Special District serving the Foothills, Genesee, and Idledale communities. We are located at 317 S. Lookout Mountain Road.

Our job is to respond to 911 medical needs – we also accompany your fire responders (Genesee and Foothills Fire & Rescue) on fire calls in case a medical issue arises.

Our team is unique – our workforce of over 50 medical professionals are primarily volunteers.

Our team is highly trained and experienced – while we recruit new members each year, many of our members have been serving as EMTs or Paramedics for many years.




When you call 911, our medical staff responds to your call and provides care to stabilize your health, and in many circumstances, transports you to a hospital. We not only serve residents of the Foothills area, but anyone traveling throughout our area no matter where they reside.

Here is what we have responded to Jan 1- Jun 30, 2022:

Number of total calls	386
Number of calls with patient contact	213
Patients transported to the hospital	144
Number of calls to incidents on I-70	76



As a Special District we receive approximately 65% of our annual budget from property taxes and 35% from fees for our services. From time to time, Highland Rescue receives tax deductible charitable donations. We use those funds for additional training and education plans for our members.
